



Overview: Young Women of Toledo

Our Young Women initiative offers an opportunity for our young women ages 12 to 26 to share, discuss, and debate constructively to help build skills, mentorship, and empowerment.

Under the Young Women of Toledo initiative, we introduce Girls Hub, a STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, and mathematics) program/activity for girls and young women ages 12 to 17 that provides a dedicated workspace in design and construction, through classes in carpentry, architecture, and civic art. With support from our STEAM mentors, our Girls Hub Builders use their creative voices and power tools to build their chairs and toolboxes, which represent their uniqueness, while examining the value of identity, voice, and lived experience in civic spaces.

We aim to support and equip a community of fearless builders. Integrating Mentor's technical skills, we believe our programs equip youth with the personal power and literal power tools to build the world they want to see.

This year, 2025, our Alumni Builders were introduced to two new pieces of equipment- a SawStop Industrial Saw and an OMTech 60W CO2 Laser Engraver. They learned new skills in using more advanced woodworking tools and built an individual toolbox and bench for the charity.
